World Cultural Heritage Site celebrating beauty beyond time immemorial

1 Byodoin Temple

The temple was established by Fujiwara-no-Yorimichi in 1052. It is registered as a World Cultural Heritage Site and houses many National Treasures. The highlight is the Houou-do (Phoenix Hall) depicted on the 10-yen coin. Admire the seated image of the Amida created by the sculptor Jocho, and the reflection of the stunning main hall in the Ajiike Pond.

2 Chazuna, a historical park for the tea and town of Uii



A park and multipurpose facility right by Uji Station. The park, created along the banks of the Uji River, is verdant and open. In addition to tea fields, it has a museum, restaurants, and more. Beyond the history and culture of Uji, visitors can rediscover the appeal of Uji tea. An exhibit on this year's NHK Taiga Drama can be seen on the second floor until January 13, 2025.

Japan's oldest shrine architecture


Ujikami-jinja Shrine

The Main Hall was constructed in the latter half of the Heian period (794-1185), making it the oldest extant shrine architecture in Japan. The Worship Hall was built in the early Kamakura period (1185-1333). Both halls are National Treasures, and also registered as World Cultural Heritage sites. Kasuga-jinja Shrine, built on the grounds during the Kamakura period, is also an Important Cultural Property. The Kiriharasui in the grounds is the only remaining spring of the Seven Famed Waters of Uji, and is used in the nurification basin



Gekkeikan Okura Sake Museum

A museum of sake alongside the Hori River, a tributary of the Uji River, where jukkokubune transport boats ply up and down. Here you can see precious tools used for sake-making and other materials related to the nearly 400-year history of sake brewer Gekkeikan. After visiting, you can enjoy sampling the sort of special sake you would expect from a museum. (Must be age 20 or older) The museum shop carries a range of sakes and sake vessels which make perfect souvenirs.

Iwashimizu Hachimangu

1 Iwashimizu Hachimangu Shrine

Iwashimizu Hachimangu Shrine was split off from Usa Jingu, the head of all Hachiman shrines, in the early Heian period (794-1185). The main hall's Hachiman-zukuri parallel architectural style and the shrine's historical value won it National Treasure designation. Known to ward off evil, Iwashimizu attracts crowds year round.

4 Fushimi-Inari Taisha Shrine

Busy with worshipers through the year. Many of the worshipers visit the Main Hall, which is an Important Cultural Property, then pass through the avenues of torii gateways, and make a wish at the "omokaru-ishi" (light and heavy stone). Don't miss the fox goods lined up in the shops along the approach route.





A mystical temple on the sacred mountain of Kurama

Murama-dera Temple

Gancho, the leading disciple of St. Ganjin (Ch. Jianzhen) founded this temple in 770 installing a statue of Bishamonten. It is the head temple of all Kurama Buddhism temples. The Reiho Hall exhibits a number of the temple's treasures, such as a statue of Bishamonten that is registered as a National Treasure. As a young man, Minamoto-no-Yoshitsune is said to have trained here with the tengu goblins. There is a site associated with him on the mountain path leading from behind the Main Hall to the Inner Sanctum.

▶The Kondo is where the statues of the Thousand-Armed Kannon, Bishamonten, and the "Defender Lord" (identified with Sanat Kumara) are enshrined



2 Yuki-jinja Shrine

This shrine was once venerated within the Kyoto Imperial Palace as the guardian deity of the imperial family. On its grounds are the Great Sugi, a sacred cryptomeria tree about 800 years old, as well as koma-inu depicted holding babies. The deity here is worshiped as the guardian of conception and safe birth.

1 Kifune-jinja Shrine

An ancient shrine along the Kibune River, the source of the Kamo River, it enshrines the god of controlling the waters. The poet Izumi Shikibu came here to pray in the Heian period (794-1185), and once more regained the love of her husband. Ever since, it has been popular as a shrine for matchmaking. Worshipers can gain benefits that include conception and other relationships.

Sanzen-in Temple

One of the Five Tendai Monzeki temples, or temples whose head priests used to be members of the imperial family, it is home to National Treasure Buddhist statues and beautiful gardens. The grounds include the Guest Hall with its shoin room, the Amida Hall which houses a statue of Amida flanked by retainers, the Shinden or Main Hall where rituals are carried out, and other dignified buildings, as well as two beautiful gardens, the Yusei-en and the Shoheki-en. attracting many visitors. The leaves are spectacular in autumn, and the temple looks wonderful in all seasons.

2 Jakko-in Temple

This is a Tendai-sect nunnery that is said to have been founded to pray for the spirit of Emperor Yomei, Prince Shotoku's father, in 594. After the House of Taira collapsed, Taira-no-Kiyomori's daughter, Kenreimon-in, lived in seclusion here. The temple also appears in the Ohara Goko section concluding the Tale of the Heike.
